
Class of '93










Class of 95'










Future Homemakers





National Honor Society



THE GULF WAR AT A GLANCE

In the early hours of dawn, in Baghdad, Iraq, on the day of January 16, 1991, the skies were lit up as bombs fell from planes flying overhead. Saddam Hussein had passed up his chance to get out of Kawait before the United Nations deadline of January 15, 1991, so in turn the Allies and the U.S. began to engage in war with Iraq. Support for the U.S. Troops had been shown throughout America in many ways. Yellow ribbons hanging in yards and pinned on jackets, flags flowing in the air, and letters sent non-stop to Saudi Arabia, which have kept the mail- personnel working overtime.
