
Topping the Stars

An average meet started with a small introduction, and then the competitions would begin. Weight classes would be announced, the contestants would shake hands, and the match would begin. If there was more than one person in the same weight category, there would have been a "wrestle off" in practice to decide who would go first. The wrestling events took place with the smallest adversaries starting out and finishing with the largest antagonists. Competitions were different than meets in that they did not really have an introduction, and instead of each person wrestling only one other person, an individual wrestled any number from two to eight opponents. Every member has an individual record of their

achievements. Points are earned in various ways, with each accomplishment gaining different point amounts. 




"Star"dom












Little Angels






Security Blanket








Guys spent an average of \$85, including; a tux, a new pair of socks to work with the dress shoes, eating out and admission to prom.


