


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Leaving our Mark






"The Pops Concert was my favorite to practice for because the songs were familiar and everyone liked to play them," 6th grade flutist Abby Schneider stated, as she recalled playing "Dances with Wolves". Concluding the year, the band held a Spring Concert. Here, individual members were acknowledged for their accomplishments and contributions throughout the school year. "Band for these students does not end with the school year", confirmed Kelli Zastrow, "We continue lessons throughout the summer" Middle School Band planted an element that one will refer back to whenever the radio is turned on in travel.





During the school's talent show, Lunamoona found her true calling, performing! She decided to let the pirates have her treasure; to the pirate's astonishment, it was buried right under the stage!



Long Trip From Home














SETTING UP THE ROAD

















Augusta School District, the soccer team had help




